

COMPANY FINED \$85K AFTER WORKER KILLED IN 2013

A Vaughan company has been fined almost six years after an employee was crushed to death on the job, according to the Ministry of Labour.

Found guilty under the Occupational Health and Safety Act last October following a trial, Cobra Float Services Inc., of Bowes Road, northeast of Keele Street and Hwy. 7 in Concord, was fined \$85,000 on March 19

On May 25, 2013, a worker was killed in Brampton when a machine overturned while being taken off a float trailer, the ministry said in a statement. As the machine was being backed off the trailer, a wheel dropped into a gap between the ramps and flipped over, crushing and killing the victim.

Cobra should have provided a continuous ramp across the whole width of the trailer or ensured a portable ramp was secured in place between the trailer ramps, the ministry said. In addition, there was no spotter overseeing the off-loading, the machine's controls were set to auto so that it would attempt to level itself with any change in surface height and the height of the machine was set 10 inches higher than recommended, which increased its centre of gravity and made it less stable, the ministry said.

The company failed to ensure procedures under the Occupational Health and Safety Act were followed, it said.
